
Respect. Protect. Enjoy!

Belmont is a 3,500-acre working estate made up of farmland, woodland and parkland situated within the North Downs AONB.

Know where you can go

There are several public footpaths crossing the estate farmland, these are indicated by finger pointed posts or yellow footpath signs – please do not stray from these public footpaths. A good ordnance survey map will show where the footpaths are. Depending on the scale of OS map the footpaths are indicated with a red dotted line (see below) or green dotted line. Please note there are no public footpaths over the parkland at Belmont.





Respect the people who live and work in the countryside

Show courtesy and consideration to everybody. Be a friendly visitor with a responsible manner.

Keep to the public footpaths

Please keep to the footpaths so that the other users of the Estate are not disturbed. **Do not walk** around the edge of a field unless there is a footpath sign indicating that a public right of way follows the edge of the field.

There are some fields where the footpath does cross a grass field with livestock – please go quietly and remember to keep your dog on the lead. Some livestock are wary of dogs and people, so please proceed quietly to avoid putting yourself in danger or causing the livestock any stress.

Leave gates as you find them

If you find a gate closed, close it when you pass through to prevent animals straying. Help our farmers by leaving gates as you find them. If in doubt, close a gate.

Keep dogs under control

Keep your dog on a lead, always, especially when walking on the footpaths of the Belmont Estate.

Take your litter home

All litter is unsightly and a danger to the wildlife. Glass, tins, and plastic bags can be dangerous to people, livestock, and wildlife. Keep the countryside clean by taking home your own litter and please pick up any litter which you may find and take this home too.

Please respect the beauty of our estate and those who live and work on it by leaving this beautiful place as you found it.

We are currently working on a possible 'permitted' circuit walk that would start and finish at the park; we hope to share with you shortly. In the meantime, go with care and take a moment to stand, stare and breathe. Enjoy.
