

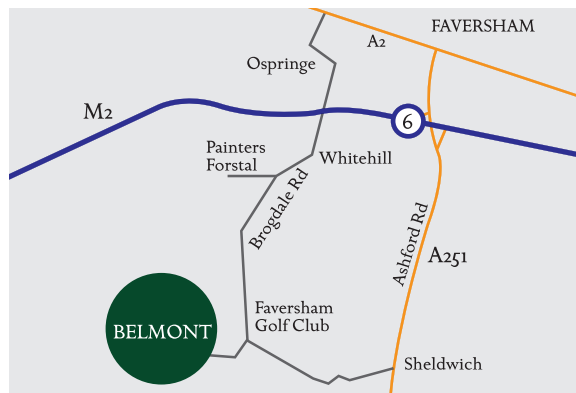


A beautiful Georgian house, full of five generations of the Harris family's treasures and commanding stunning views of the rolling Kent countryside.

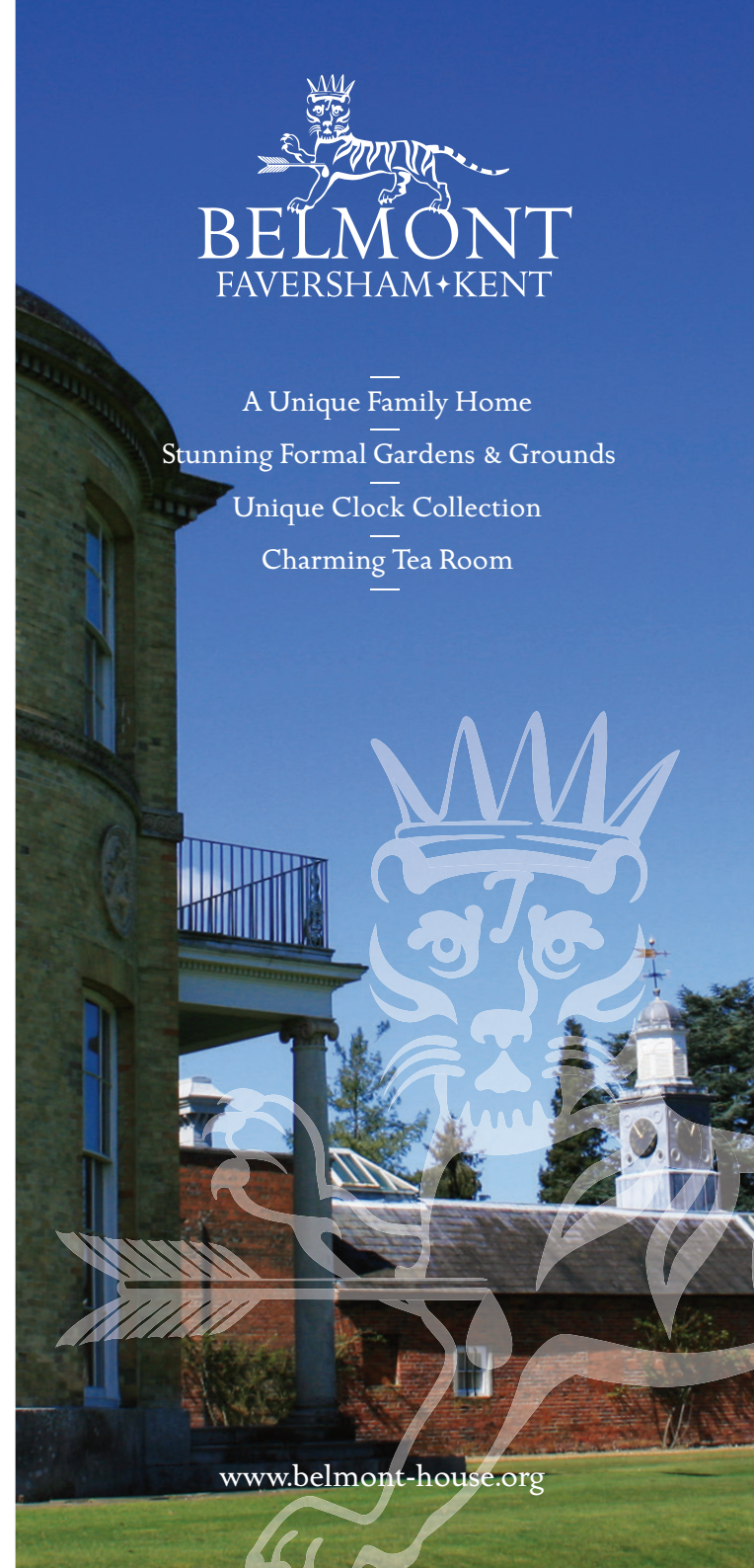


SAFETY INFORMATION

A BRIEF HISTORY

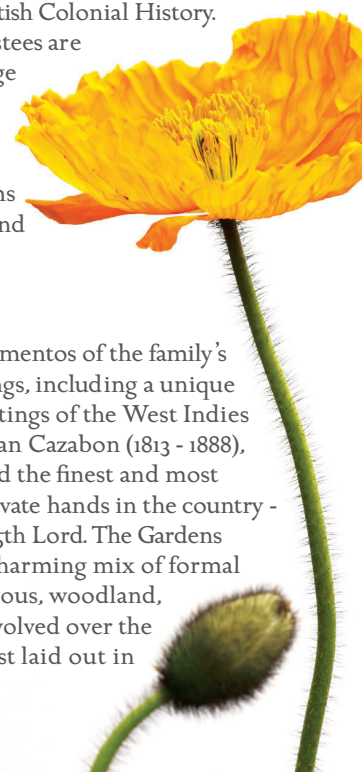
General George Harris bought the House in 1801 with the prize money from his successful military career in India. Later, in 1815, he was created Lord Harris in recognition of his victory over Tipu Sultan at the Battle of Seringapatam. Successive Lords Harris played a prominent role in British expansion overseas throughout the 19th century.

TODAY

The House and its surrounding estate are part of the Harris Belmont Charity; a private trust created by the 5th Lord Harris with the aim of preserving the Estate, the House, and its contents for future generations to learn about the Family's part in 200 years of British Colonial History. In support of this aim, the Trustees are actively involved in a wide range of projects that include the restoration of the parkland, the re-establishment of chalk downland and traditional forms of woodland management.

A HIDDEN GEM

Belmont contains fabulous mementos of the family's history and travels, fine paintings, including a unique collection of watercolour paintings of the West Indies by Trinidadian artist Michel Jean Cazabon (1813 - 1888), furniture, Indian silverware and the finest and most extensive range of clocks in private hands in the country - a collection assembled by the 5th Lord. The Gardens surrounding the House are a charming mix of formal and informal planting, herbaceous, woodland, fruit and vegetable that have evolved over the years since the gardens were first laid out in the late 18th century.
